Principal’s Academic Culture Change Propels MasteryPrep Partner School to Score Highest ACT Growth in Mississippi

“You can shoot a basketball. But what’s your ACT? If you can combine those, you really will be a rock star.”

Such is the message of North Forrest High School Principal Jennifer Riels to her students on the importance of achieving high standardized test scores, gaining entry to college, and earning scholarship awards.

The full court press and message was well received.

Forrest County School District posted the largest ACT growth in Mississippi, leaping from an average composite score of 15.9 to 18.2 (2.3-point increase). It was the second year in a row that a MasteryPrep partner school posted the highest ACT growth in Mississippi. Forrest County has partnered with MasteryPrep since 2016.

North Forrest High School, located in Eatonville County, Miss., is the only high school in the Forrest County School District, with 375 students in grades 7 -12. Thirty-two percent of students belong to minorities, and 71 percent qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Forrest County used MasteryPrep’s ACT TruScore program to provide students an authentic practice test and help their teachers make data-driven instructional decisions to close gaps. 

Academic Culture Change – Tips for Success

North Forrest High School Principal Jennifer Riels shared several tips for success when trying to increase scores school-wide.

1. Implement dedicated one-semester class (mandatory unless already scoring 20-plus).
 - Select a strong instructor to teach the class.
2. Persist across multiple years.
 - Build expertise and capacity over a long period of time.
3. Use TruScore for 9th through 11th graders.
 - Detailed reports from practice tests give teachers clear test-taking skill metrics and data-driven recommendations.
4. Employ professional development to build buy-in with teachers.
 - It takes several years to change the culture of faculty, staff, and then see it trickle down to students.
5. Support students every way you can.
 - Buy test vouchers, extra test administrations, and help students sign up for tests.



“18 and You’re In”

North Forrest High School started an ACT Club, which included entry to all students scoring 18 and above. There are celebrations, recognitions around school, awards for silver, bronze, and gold levels, and t-shirts made. To further prepare students for college, North Forrest High School partnered with William Carey University to offer Dual Enrollment classes that enable students to attain up to 27 hours of college credit prior to graduation. North Forrest High School also offers classes that target individual’s interests, such as: culinary arts, allied health, construction, art, drama, Spanish, and digital media.

“We simply changed the whole environment and attitude towards getting into college, invested in our kids, and got them to realize what a high score and passion for their future can do for their opportunities,” Riels said. “We are here to celebrate every step of that journey with them.”
