Elimination

It's often a less challenging task to weed out the bad answers than it is to pinpoint the perfect one. Use these strategies to help make eliminations on the English test:

- 1. If it sounds wrong, it is wrong. Answers that are difficult to read or that create confusion are probably incorrect.
- **2.** Commas cause pauses. Pause dramatically at each punctuation mark to find incorrect answer choices with unnecessary punctuation.
